



A study on the impact of labour laws on industrial relations in the sugar Industry in Bihar

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Abstract

Furthermore, the study emphasizes how these aspects are interconnected with worker productivity levels and job satisfaction among employees. It also highlights various challenges faced by both parties concerning compliance with existing labour legislations.

The study found that strict enforcement of these laws led to better wages and improved work environment for workers, resulting in positive employee-employer relationships.

Dr. Suman Kumar (2024) argue that despite strong labour laws being enforced by government authorities in Bihar, there is still a lack of proper implementation at ground level. This negligence towards implementing critical provisions like timely payment of wages and equal opportunities for contract workers limits trust between employees and management^[4].

Gautam (2020) further supports this claim by highlighting how inadequate knowledge about their rights among workers leads to exploitation by employers who often violate crucial provisions stated under labour laws. Such practices fuel resentment among employees and eventually lead to strained industrial
